## Scrimshaw of Rhode Island

*Newport Historical Society Hosts Leading Scrimshaw Expert Dr. Stuart Frank*

NEWPORT, RI – (JANUARY 2010) – The Newport Historical Society is pleased to present “Scrimshaw of Rhode Island” with Stuart M. Frank, Ph.D., Senior Curator of the New Bedford Whaling Museum and Director Emeritus, Kendall Whaling Museum. The program will take place on Thursday, April 29, 6pm at the Colony House on Washington Square.

Using examples from the collections of the Newport Historical Society, Dr. Frank, a leading expert on scrimshaw and founder/director of the Scrimshaw Forensics Laboratory®, will discuss the unique nature of Rhode Island scrimshaw. The hour-long presentation includes a general introduction to the history and art of scrimshaw and a Q&A session.

Following the presentation will be an *Antiques Road Show*-style appraisal session with Dr. Frank’s Scrimshaw Forensics Laboratory® team. Collectors of scrimshaw and general maritime antiques are invited to bring their treasured pieces for a verbal appraisal.

General admission costs \$5 per person and \$1 for NHS members. Verbal appraisals cost \$25 per item, which includes admission to the lecture. One appraisal is complimentary with the purchase of a new or renewing membership to the Newport Historical Society.
